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AIDS in OHIO

Last May Gov. Richard F. Celeste began a campaign to educate the public about AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome). "The State of Ohio through the Ohio Department of Health has taken strong initiatives, receiving national recognition in our AIDS prevention and education programs," said Gov. Celeste.

The theme for the educational campaign is "AIDS...an Ounce of Prevention...Because There is No Cure." According to Dr. Ronald L. Fletcher, director, Ohio Department of Health, "Prevention is the best defense against AIDS. It starts with being aware of what AIDS is and how the virus which causes AIDS is transmitted."

As of April 1987, there were 352 cases reported to the Ohio Department of Health, which ranks Ohio eighteenth in the nation in cases reported to the Federal Government's Centers for Disease Control. The Ohio Department of Health estimates there will be approximately 3,000-5,000 new AIDS cases by 1991.

Hamilton County has had 36 reported cases of AIDS and ranks third behind Cuyahoga County with 99 and Franklin County with 64.

In Ohio 158 of the 352 reported cases were between the age of 30-39, 272 were white and 73 were black, 330 were male and 22 female.

In terms of the risk groups in Ohio, 256 cases were Gay/Bisexual males, 17 resulted from IV drugs, 35 cases from a combination of Gay and Drugs, 15 from Hemophilia, 6 from Heterosexual contact, 10 from blood products, and 13 cases listed as other.

Seven Steps to AIDS Prevention:

1. Know your sexual partners, their past sexual history, and drug use.
2. Barring abstinence, condoms are the next best way to prevent sexual transmission of the AIDS virus.
3. If you or your partner may be infected, cease sexual relations or follow safer sexual practices which avoid the exchange of body fluids.
4. Be aware that having multiple sexual partners and/or anonymous sexual partners significantly increases your chances of contracting AIDS.
5. Don't use intravenous (I.V.) drugs unless directed by a physician.
6. If you do use I.V. drugs, do not share or re-use needles or syringes.
7. Avoid sexual contact with persons who use unprescribed I.V. drugs.

Basketball Recruit Killed in Car Crash

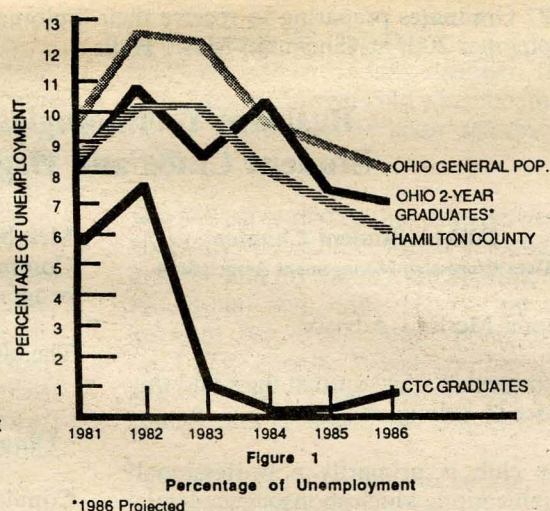
Tony Commodore who signed to play at Cincinnati Technical College was killed in an automobile accident on September 8, 1987, when the car in which he was riding rolled several times and crashed into a ditch in Taylor Mill, Kentucky.

Tony, who previously played basketball at Newport High School, was dead on arrival at St. Elizabeth Medical Center North in Covington.

He was scheduled to start classes on September 9 at CTC, where he was to major in business management. Coach Hurley stated, "Tony Commodore was a fine young man and his death was such a waste. We were counting on him to contribute greatly to our team. It has been such a shock to both myself and our players. Our players have decided to dedicate the season in his memory."

CTC GRADUATE PLACEMENT RATE OUTSTANDING

The primary mission of Cincinnati Technical College is to prepare its graduates for immediate technical employment. A review of the graduate placement rates for the past six years shows that the graduates are being employed at a much higher rate than others available for the work force. Figure 1 shows the unemployment rates for Cincinnati Technical College (CTC) graduates, for other two-year technical graduates, for Hamilton County, and for the State of Ohio. Over the six year period, the unemployment rate for CTC graduates averaged 2 percent. In 1984, all graduates were employed. The graduating class averaged 600 per year.



Graduates of Cincinnati Technical College are employed in their technical areas of study at a higher rate than other Ohio two-year graduates.

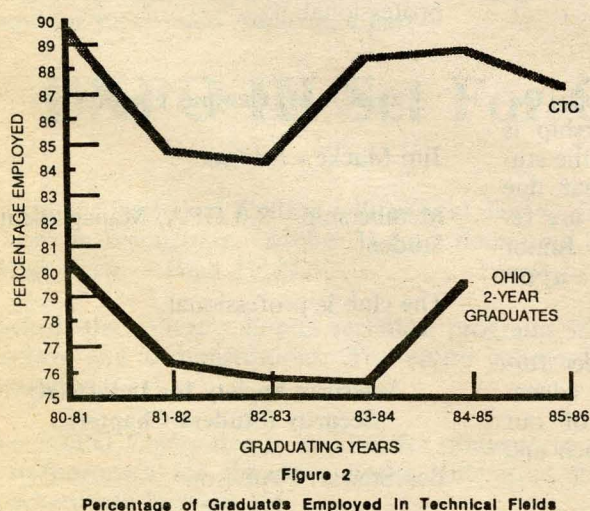


Figure 2 shows the placement rate for CTC graduates versus other two-year graduates. Over the six year period, the average placement rate of CTC graduates in their fields of study was 87.2 percent. The average amount of difference in the placement rates in the technical field between CTC graduates and other two-year graduates over the five year period from 1980-1 through 1984-85 was 9.5 percent.

An important contributing factor to the placement rate of CTC graduates is the cooperative education component of the curriculum. Most graduates earn an associate degree and complete a full year of work experience during their stay at the College.

CTC's basketball "Tigers" are getting ready to open practice on September 28, with an eye on bettering their 1986-87 record of 17-15.

"Last year was not as successful as we thought it would be," states Coach John Hurley. "We had many injuries and we lost five players off our team for one reason or another during the season. We were a very inconsistent team last year, consequently our goal this year is to be more consistent in all areas of the game."

The Tigers open practice with six return lettermen. They are: Phil Rich, 6'2" guard, Neal Kennedy, 6'3" forward, Steve Johnson 6'8" forward, William Moore, 6'4" forward, Terry Gampfer, 7'0" center, and Ron Pahlsson, 6'10" center. Only Rice 8.5 pts per game and Moore 10.1 pts. per game saw much action last year.

From the Freeze



Scarpelli could take *Free Rein*

Members of Free Rein, a Cincinnati rock 'n' roll band will be taking it one day at a time until they hear whether television actor Glenn Scarpelli wants to sing with the group, too.

Scarpelli, who played little Alex on the CBS series *One Day At A Time* (1980-85), dipped into Cincinnati over the weekend to meet band members and see them play Saturday night at the Vegas Club in Erlanger, Ky.

"If I like the band, I'll see if I can use them in some way," Scarpelli said in an interview after attending the Reds-Padres game Saturday afternoon. "I am always looking for talented musicians."

Scarpelli, who made his Broadway debut at age 10 in *Golda* with Anne Bancroft, released an album four years ago for CBS Records. He sings at the White House, during the annual Easter Egg Hunt one week from today.

By that time, the band, formed seven years ago by Oak Hills High School students, may know if it will be hitching its wagon to a star. Free Rein members are: Eric Schueler, vocals; Ken Fullam, bass; Jeff Abbott, guitar; Greg Martini, drums; and John Schutte, keyboard.

"There's a good possibility that it will happen," says Stuart Addison, 21, band production manager.

"I'm not going to say anything until I know for sure," said Addison, a part-

time WEBN-FM employee. His mother, Sharry, co-chaired the recent World Figure Skating Championships here last month.

Addison's uncle, New York television producer Larry Patterson, brought Scarpelli to town Friday. Patterson is working on his second television deal involving Scarpelli — a possible 1988 fall television series reuniting him with comedian Pat ("Schneider") Harrington Jr.

"I'm real anxious to get back on television," says Scarpelli who turns 21 in July. "It's the most satisfying work an actor can have."

At the height of *One Day At A Time*, Scarpelli had a 15,000 member fan club. He was 14 years old when he joined the series for its sixth season in 1980.

Scarpelli now divides his time between his Hollywood home, which he bought in 1980, and his Manhattan apartment. His mom and dad, Henry, an illustrator for *Archie* comic books live on Long Island. While waiting for another show business break, he studies film at New York University.

"I kind of let nature take its course. I'd like to be back on TV," he said. "You know, I'm a freshman now and I should be a junior. Some big things are on the horizon and I'll have to do some soul-searching to see what my priorities are."

The nuclear arms race is the biggest threat to our national and world security in history. Yet, there are citizens in the U.S. and elsewhere exercising leadership in this crisis situation, saying it's time to halt the arms race. The Freeze is a part of that grassroots movement.

On Sunday, October 18, the Greater Cincinnati Nuclear Weapons Freeze will hold our annual **Freeze Walk for Peace**. Last year, we had 400 participants, raised 1/6 of our yearly budget, educated our neighbors, and had fun - while walking with the belief that we can and must freeze the arms race.

On the brink of a U.S. - U.S.S.R. agreement on intermediate-range missiles, we also come together to show our support of continued arms control negotiations. Thanks to concerned citizens, like Freeze activists, public officials no longer talk about a "winnable nuclear war." A test ban is within reach. S.D.I. (Star Wars) is being hotly debated. The local Fernald uranium processing plant is being more closely monitored. So, step by step, we work (and walk) for our vision of a world free from the threat of nuclear

war, where millions going to feed the arms race can instead feed social and economic development programs, where young people can feel hopeful about the future.

The Freeze Walk is a 10 kilometer (6.2 miles) route beginning and ending at Fountain Square, passing through Covington, Newport, and downtown Cincinnati. Each walker is asked to get a sponsor to contribute money for each kilometer walked. Donations (95% of them) go to support the work of our local Freeze in maintaining an office, a part-time staff person, monthly educational programs, a quarterly newsletter, etc. (5% goes to the Ohio Freeze based in Columbus, Ohio)

There are many yearnings deep within us which cry for peace. Let us allow our vision of peace to grow as we join with others and act on those visions. A sense of empowerment results from being involved and sharing whatever our talents are. All that we care for now and in the future can serve as a source of inspiration for working to solve this most important challenge to the survival of life on this planet. Manufacturing In The U.S.: What Has Happened And What Can Be Done.

Manufacturing in the U.S. is not healthy. Anyone who watches the news, listens to the radio or reads the newspaper has certainly seen, heard of read about plant closings or massive layoffs. Manufacturing is not only synonomous with the making of cars, but is also synonomous with many other consumer goods made. Many of the manufacturing industries in the U.S. have been in a state of decline for the past 6-7 years.

What are the reasons manufacturing, locally and across the nation has for the past number of years declined, in both quality and quantity of goods produced, and in our overall lack of ability to compete with our foriegn competition? Ten different people in the manufacturing industry would probably give you ten different good, valid reasons. One of the most influential reason, however, is management. The present management in most of todays' company's know very little of what is required for their positions. Management in most of todays' manufacturing companies do an inadequate job in communicating well with their employees, getting the most out of each employees' skill level, and finally are not willing to accept factory automation as a means to improve productivity.

In the 1960's and early 1970's, manufacturing in the U.S. was healthy and rising rapidly. Managers were desperately needed to oversee employees and the manufacturing processes themselves. This desperate need resulted in employees being put into managerial postions without the education, background and training needed to perform properly at these new positions. Thus, with the absence of these qualities in management manufacturing on the whole has declined.

One of the most important abilities a manager must have is to, day to day, communicate well with fellow managers and other white and blue collar employees in the plant. Communication is the key to basically everything in life, and manufacturing is no exception. The manager must be able to communicate to all, in an understandable fashion, his and the plants goals, plans and needs.

Managers today do not know the skills of there employees as well as they should. An employee might have a skill such as the ability to run a computer or have the ability to translate a manual written in a foriegn language. These task can be carried out while the employee still performs his or her "real" job. With management more aware of an employees skills and putting those skills to good use, the employees' production value increases tremendously.

Automation (computerized fabrication equipment, robotics etc.) is a very realistic avenue to higher production. With automated equipment, the human factors are almost non-existent, with the exception of humans programming the software most of the automated equipment runs on. The software, however, can be debugged. The drawback is that management is often intimidated by the thought of taking the step toward automation because the managers themselves and there employees know little about and are not familar with automated equipment. True, the start up cost of automating a manufacturing plant is high, but in order to compete, management must be willing to take the step. It is safe to say that 90% of the companies 7-10 years from now who do not automate their plants between now and then will be forced to close their doors.

Management is not completely at fault for the decline of manufacturing in the U.S. over the past number of years. Factors such as labor unions, personnel itself and the U.S. economy play a role, but some of these factors could also be contained by management. The key to the U.S. regaining it's edge and ability to compete with the foriegn competition is knowledgalbe, willing management and well planned factory automation with the properly trained personnel to implement and operate the system.

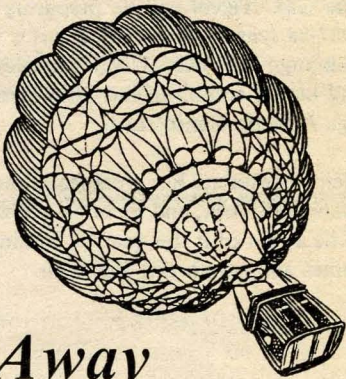
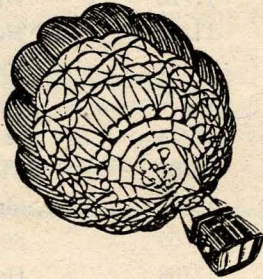

Up, Up, and Away

CTC's Counseling Center presented a three week pre-college high school workshop, *Up, Up, and Away*, under the direction of Dr. Claudette McCarty, June 8 through June 26. Twenty female students, represented eight area high schools: Aiken High School, CAPE, Hughes High School, McAuley High School, Mother of Mercy High School, School of Creative and Performing Arts, Taft High School and Western Hills High School. The focus of the program was to explore non-traditional career options for females. The girls came to CTC with the endorsement of their math and science teachers in addition to that from their school counselor.

During the three-week period the girls participated in computer science, and engineer-

ing labs; career assessment mods; counseling mods; film and presentation mods; and industrial tour day; and interview mods involving co-op students and professional role models. They heard and interviewed twenty-one speakers from twelve area companies. Six CTC co-op students and thirty faculty/staff members gave presentations or worked with the students in some way.

The Counseling Center has received a new grant from the Ohio Department of Education, Division of Vocational and Career Education, to finance *Up, Up, & Away II* next summer. Eligible high school participants must be entering sophomore female students who have completed algebra I and who have pre-registered for or taken geometry.

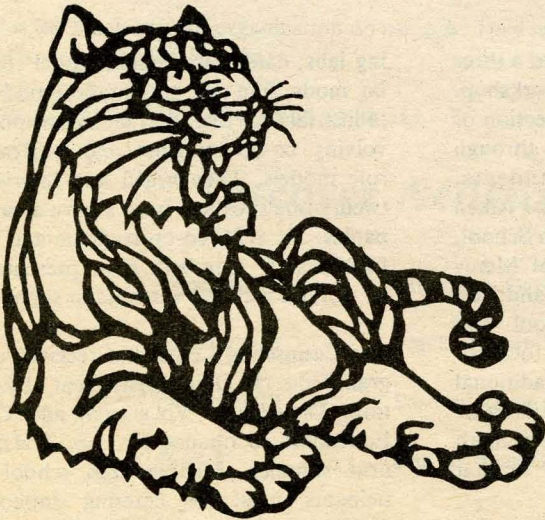
