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The Women's Center

The Women's Center at Cincinnati Technical College is open to all women students. The Center is a place for women to come together to share concerns; a place to go between classes to meet others and make contacts; a place where women can develop their own support network.

One of the primary goals of the Center is to provide programs, activities and services which are designed to assist women students in overcoming and eliminating barriers to co-op employment.

Career Development workshops (i.e., skills identification, identifying interests, values clarification) are offered to help women increase their self-awareness of who they are, where they are going and how they will get there.

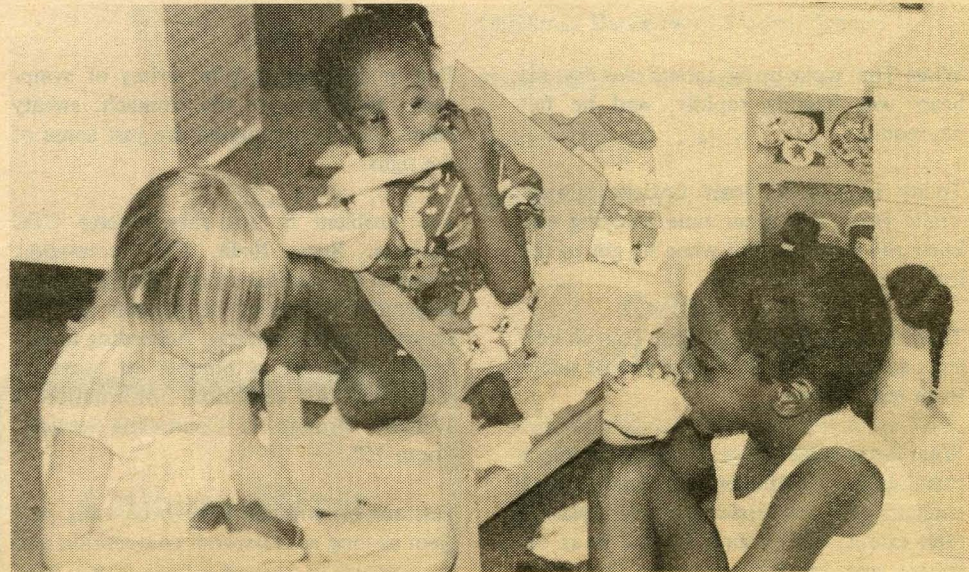
Resume writing, job interviewing skills, decision-making and goal setting workshops are available to help women

students approach the job search with a sense of confidence.

Assertiveness training, understanding your personality, self-esteem building, conflict management, and time management workshops are designed to promote positive self-concepts and attitudes in women students as well as providing them with an opportunity to take better control over their lives.

Programs sponsored by the Women's Center are open to all students. Young Children Attend School At Cincinnati Tech

Children under the age of five now attend the Cincinnati Technical College! Although none of the youngsters are enrolled in laser optics or phlebotomy studies, their parents are. Children of students in any of the varied programs offered at CTC may be registered for age-appropriate learning in the college's new William L. Mallory Child Development Center.

The center, operated by the Salvation Army, was conceptualized by CTC President Frederick Schlimm nine years ago. Ohio House Representative William L. Mallory (D) presented the idea to then Governor Rhodes.

It is felt that college students with children may be better able to concentrate on their studies if stress related to child care could be minimized. The college has provided

\$40,000 annually to offset the costs of child care for its students.

CTC faculty and other staff also may send their children to the well-equipped and professionally staffed center. A limited number of slots are reserved for community (non-CTC) families. Information regarding this program is available from Denise Steward, Director, 569-1504.

The center is located in the new wing on the 4th floor. The hours for the September Term are 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The center is licensed by the City of Cincinnati's Department of Health and the State of Ohio's Department of Health and Human Services.

Fees for the William L. Mallory Child Development Center are as follows:

Fees are due two weeks in advance.

Drinking Age Officially 21 For Ohioans

In June, the new drinking age was voted in by Ohio General Assembly members who feared the federal government, backed by the U.S. Supreme Court, would cut off highway money.

Those who are 19 on or before July 31, 1987 can continue to buy beer. But, anyone who turns 19 after July 31, 1987 has to wait two years before being allowed to make a purchase.

This new law will affect the beer sales at CTC Student Senate functions. However, as always, students will be carded and if their hand is not stamped they will not be allowed to drink.

The Student Senate is considering selling a non-alcoholic beer for those students who now do not meet drinking age.

Student Newspaper Resurrected

It has been ten years since CTC has had a student newspaper. There have been some futile attempts in the last couple of years through Student Senate, but the last so called *real* student newspaper was last distributed in the spring of 1977.

High-school activities point to college success

Success in extracurricular activities in high school is a good indicator of later success in college, says a study released Wednesday.

A survey of 3,676 students at nine colleges shows solid high school grades and good standardized-test scores are the two top clues to college success. But extracurricular activities rank near the top.

The top five predictors:

- High school rank.
- Performance on tests such as the Scholastic Aptitude Test.

- High school honors
- Persistent success in extracurricular activities.
- Personal statements students send to colleges.

The four-year study by the College Board and Educational Testing Service found students who excelled in one or two activities were more successful in college than those who dabbled in lots of organizations.

Putting Yourself To The Test

When Tom woke up his mouth was dry; his heart was beating rapidly; and he felt nauseous.

Today he has his least favorite subject - finite math. He spent time studying and knew the material, but when he got to the test his mind went blank.

There are many students like Tom in colleges across the nation. These people suffer from test anxiety.

What is test anxiety? Dr. Nancy Stockton, a psychologist at Indiana University, said students with test anxiety are prepared for their exams. "They have studied in an effective way, but before the test they have anxiety to such a degree that he or she is kind of paralyzed," she said.

Test anxiety has a wide variety of symptoms. Butterflies in the stomach, sweaty palms, and nausea are just some of the signs.

The problem is not rare among CTC students. **Steve Roth**, CTC counselor, found in a recent survey of a class of fifteen students that 30% of the students reported experiencing test anxiety. According to Mr. Roth, there are a number of ways to counteract this condition. Information is available through the Counseling Services, Room 157.

Test anxiety will continue to be a big problem as long as classroom competition and the pressure to succeed is high. If you have problems with test-taking, see your coordinator or counselor.

Student Retention: A Place to Belong

"Retention is the buzz word now. We must learn to keep the students we manage to recruit," says Carman Neuberger, assistant provost for student life at American University. Today, keeping students requires more than simply providing a quality academic program. Advisors are meeting more often with individual students and encouraging student-faculty interaction and social activities. More and more, schools are befriending students.

Students who participate in social activities usually stay in school and eventually graduate. Students who study in the library, eat in the campus dining hall, or work as a student employee are more likely to remain in school, according to a recent study by the University of Maryland. For other students, retention also corresponds to use of the campus gym or planning an outdoor recreation trip through the student union.

To improve its retention rate, American University encourages interaction with faculty. "More and more, faculty members are responding," says Neuberger. The student services office works through the Student Life Committee of the Faculty Senate to organize activities.

"The real challenge (in retention) is with commuting students," says Carman Neuberger. American U. helps commuters through workshops and encouraging them to participate in university programs.

Traditional student services, like student health and psychological services, also promote student retention. "Everything we do has an impact on retention," says Neuberger. But, the most important are social events and student-faculty interaction.

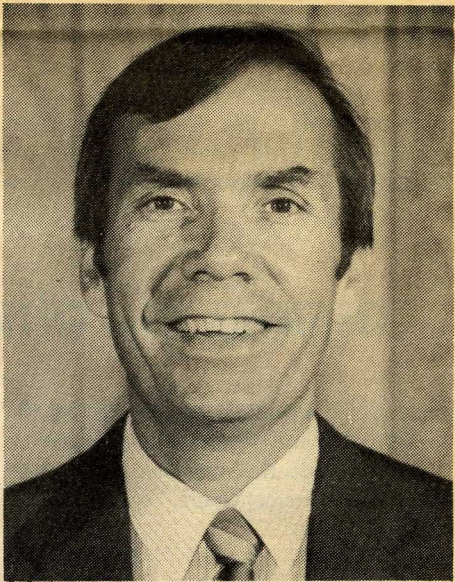

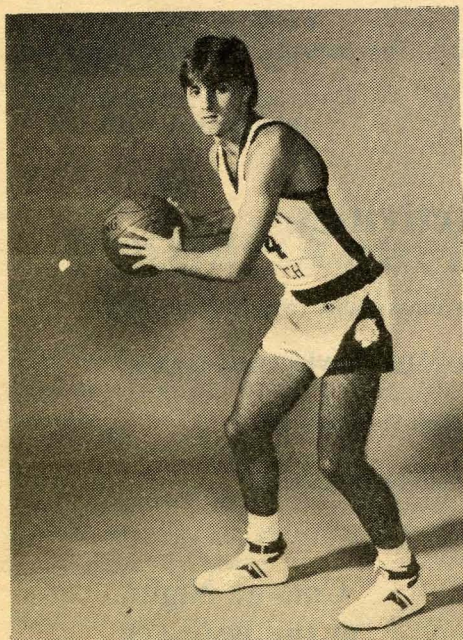

Two Tech Players Sign

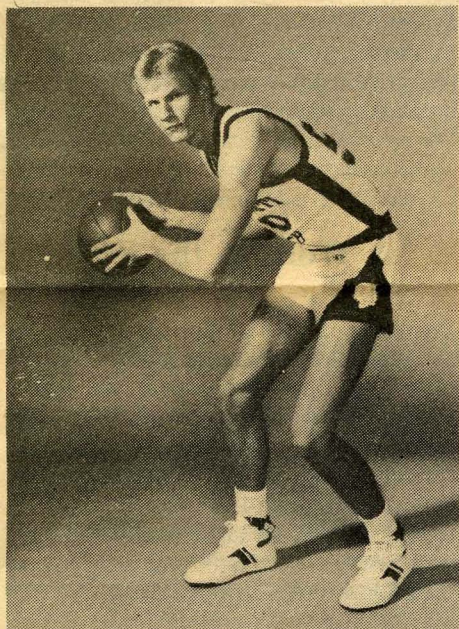
Two players on the 1986-87 Tiger basketball team have signed national letters of intent and will receive athletic scholarships.

Mason, a 1985 Elder High School graduate, averaged 15.0 points per game and was fourth in the nation in free throw percentage at 88.5 percent. 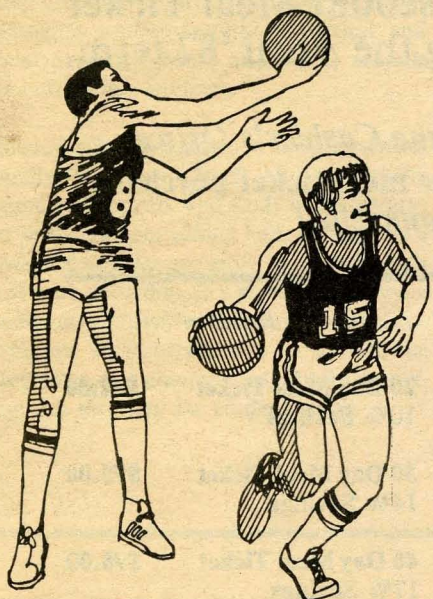

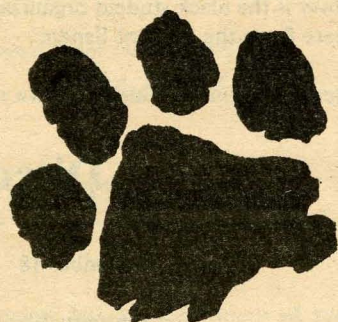

Tigers Sign Three Top Recruits

Coach John Hurley has announced the signing of three top high school basketball players.

First is Fritz Taylor, a 6'2" guard/forward from Sandusky, Ohio. Taylor was a third team Buckeye Conference player and rated one of the best players in northern Ohio. He averaged 16 points per game in high school.

Second is Myron Trimble, a 6'2½" guard from Grand Rapids, Michigan. Trimble was an All-City player averaging 12 points per game and lead his league in assists.

Third is a local player, Orlando Williams, a 6'2" guard/forward from Princeton High School. Williams averaged 15 points per game and 9 rebounds.

These were the only players signed at the printing of the newspaper, but Coach Hurley was anticipating signing at least three more players.

CTC Students Being Honored at Riverfront Stadium

A big evening is in store for two CTC students when the San Francisco Giants meet the Cincinnati Reds at Riverfront Stadium on Friday night, September 11, 1987. Dave Parker, Cincinnati Reds rightfielder, will present the first two \$1,500 David G. Parker Endowed Scholarships to 1987 high school graduates:

Ms. Shanda Carroll Scott, an honor student of Withrow High School; and

Ms. Christine Louise "Tina" Shank, second in her graduating class at Kings High School.

These students will begin their academic studies in the September term this fall. Shanda will study the Management Information Systems technology program; "Tina" the Financial Management technology program.

The Cincinnati Technical College established the "David G. Parker Scholarship Endowment" on January 12, 1985. Its purpose is to help outstanding academic students to finance their college education at CTC. The accrued interest income is to be used each year to fund scholarship awards.
