

Tuition Rates Increased

As the old saying goes, "There's nothing certain but death and taxes;" however, we may have to add to that, rising college tuition costs

USA Today newspaper reports that this year throughout the U.S. there is an overall increase in college tuition costs of about six percent.

Effective with the start of the September term, Cincinnati Technical College will increase its tuition rates and return to a flat rate scale. Depending upon how many hours are taken, the increase ranges from three to forty percent. If a student takes 17 through 20 credit hours, the bill will be less than last year's for the same number of hours.

So, basically the more credit hours signed up for (up to 20 hours), the better the deal is. If a student takes between 3 and 12 credit hours the tuition rate figures out to be a forty percent increase. The rate is the same (\$540) if students take between 12 and 18 hours

A full-time student is a student that takes 12 or more credit hours. This student is going to pay between \$28 to \$156 more per term if 12 to 16 hours are taken. If the student takes 17 or 18 credits, he/she will save money compared to last year.

Certainly when there is a financial increase on a product the consumer takes the blunt of it. How much of a burden is going to be passed on the students will be different for each student.

Students receiving financial aid will not be greatly affected by the tuition increase. The rate of the grant will be adjusted, and students not previously eligible for aid may be eligible now.

Out-of-state students have been hit the hardest by the increase. Their tuition rate is a 33 percent increase for up to 12 credit hours. An out-of-state student last year paid \$600 for 12 credits compared to this year when they will pay \$900. The college does not receive state monies for out-of-state students.

Reason given for the tuition increase was to maintain a high level of quality education.

Added to the tuition increase was an increase in parking fees. The preferred/reserved parking fee will be increased \$5 per term. Lower lot and evening parking fees will remain the same.

CTC's Dietetic Program Wins Program Excellence

CTC's dietetic technology program was the winner of an Ohio Board of Regents Program Excellence Award. The announcement, made June 17, made CTC's program one of 22 from all state colleges and universities awarded this prestigious honor. CTC is the only two-year college to win a Program Excellence Award in all three competitions.

On August 23, William Napier, vice chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents, came to CTC to deliver the \$141,262 check awarded to the program.

The funds will be used to develop a computer-interactive video system which allows students to simulate actual nutrition and diet therapy consultations with patients before the students enter their clinical practice. Marianne Krismer, program director, said the videos will simulate cases in which

patients have complex health and diet problems.

CTC's dietetics program was initiated in 1976. Before that time there were no dietetic technician positions in Greater Cincinnati. Since 1979, the program has had a 100 percent placement rate for its graduates. The program was cited for its accomplishments and status nationally and for its integration of didactic education with a correlated directed/clinical practice and a paid cooperative education component. The dietetics program has affiliation agreements with eleven area health care facilities and 21 cooperative employment sites

Napier reported that two other CTC programs --- chef technology and mechanical engineering technology --- "just missed" being winners this year.

CTC Names New VP

Dr. Gordon M. Fooks has joined the administrative staff at Cincinnati Technical College as vice president for institutional development and community relations. He returns to Cincinnati from Indiana State University in Terre Haute where he was the associate director of the Career Center.

Dr. Fooks was active in the Cincinnati area from 1982 to 1987. He served as managing director of INROADS, Cincinnati, and he is a graduate of the Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Cincinnati Class VIII.

The new vice president also was active in the community of Wyoming. He served as a member of the board of trustees of the Wyoming School Foundation and as a representative to the citizens advisory committee of the Wyoming Board of Education. Dr. Fooks also was a member of the City of Wyoming's Civil Service Commission.

As CTC's vice president for institutional development and community relations Dr. Fooks will oversee the college's fundraising and public relations offices as well as minority affairs and student activities. He will represent CTC in the Cincinnati Youth Collaborative and other area educational and civic activities.

Dr. Fooks' educational background is in counselor education and the study of vocational development, career planning and

decision making of the culturally different. He earned a baccalaureate degree from Temple University and master's and doctorate degrees from Penn State University.

Dr. Fooks, his wife Clarice and their two children reside in Wyoming.

Dr. Fooks replaces Dr. John L. Henderson, who left CTC to assume the presidency of Wilberforce University.

CTC Fifth Largest College in Area

According to the Greater Cincinnati Business Record, CTC is ranked fifth in enrollment in the Greater Cincinnati area. U.C. is ranked first with 36,194 students, Miami second with 19,300 students, NKU third with 9,020 students, and Xavier fourth with 6,523 students.

If you exclude Miami and NKU, CTC has the third largest enrollment in Cincinnati proper with 4,685 students.

Participation in Extracurricular Activities Valuable!

Reader's Digest, in a recent article on "Improving Your Chances For Getting Into College," states, "These activities reveal your sparkle facts; or, as Tulane's Lois Conrad describes them: leadership, community spirit, volunteerism, competitive nature, ability to work with others, and stick-to-itiveness."

Of course, to be involved in activities you will need to juggle your time. You don't want your grades to suffer.

So, this Fall, when you hear the call to join, think seriously about signing up, it may truly be worth your effort.

What do you think of the tuition increase and How will it affect you personally?

Steve Kavanaugh (out-of-state)

"I don't see the increase affecting me that much. NKU for in-state is as much as CTC in-state. I did attend NKU for one year. Most schools are raising tuition and the full-time deal is good. Will not create any hardship."

Ken Foster (in-state) CPET

"Doesn't affect me personally because my work is paying for it. I support CTC and it has been a great experience for me. It still is a darn good tuition rate. It is too bad that some of the co-op employers couldn't help support the college more."

Julie Haft (in-state) CISP

"I think that it is too much of a hike. It helps me out when I am taking a lot of courses, but not when I am taking night classes. I would like to know exactly what the increase is for. Not a fair situation for out-of-state students."

Honi Kleine (out-of-state) MET

"I am from Indiana and there are a lot of students from Indiana that go here, and the reason we chose here was because it is close and cheap. There are six students from my high school. If you consider travel and what we will have to pay now it will make it about the same as an instate school. I feel it is not a fair situation. NKU has a tuition rate for the greater Cincinnati area that is the same as Kentucky in-state."

Mozaffar Chowdhury (in-state) CPET

"It definitely will be a hardship for me. I pay for my classes, I am from Bangladesh and I came here for technical studies. I have to be in college, but it's going to be real difficult for me to come up with the extra money."





CTC Staffer Receives Excellence Award

Jerry A. Froehlich, placement coordinator for Cincinnati Technical College's civil engineering technology (CET) and computer integrated manufacturing technology programs, is the 1988 recipient of CTC's annual Clifford R. House Award for Coordination Excellence.

Froehlich is the fourth annual winner of this award, named in honor of CTC's first president. It is given each year to recognize excellence in coordination, and the recipient is selected by CTC faculty and staff.

A resident of Western Hills, Froehlich has been with CTC since 1978. In his current position, he is responsible for the placement of students at cooperative education job sites and of graduates in permanent posi-

Said Terry Brown, director of the co-op coordination for the engineering technologies division, "I think it's super that Jerry is this year's winner. He is one of the most deserving people for the award...He has maintained a great placement for his technologies..."

Gregory Sketch, chairman of CTC's CET program, agreed, "Jerry has such a good relationship and reputation with the employers...Jerry has consistently visited over 95-percent of the companies that are employing CET co-ops, and most of the time it is a 100-percent...Jerry meets with each prospective co-op and determines his or her wants and needs..."

In addition to his placement duties, Froehlich is also president and executive committee member of CTC's Faculty Senate; serves on CTC's College Finance Review Committee, Cooperative Education Committee and Merit Review Committee; serves on the Ohio Cooperative Education Executive Committee and Public Relations Committee for the American Society for Engineering Education; and is on the Program Board of the 1989 Midwest Cooperative Education Association's convention. Covedale Resident Receives Top Teaching Award

Frank A. Iacobucci, a mathematics instructor at Cincinnati Technical College, is the 1988 recipient of the college's annual Alice P. Bruckmann Award for Teaching Excellence. Iacobucci is the fourth annual winner of this award named in honor of a member of CTC's first Board of Trustees.

Iacobucci was selected to receive the award by his colleagues and peers at CTC. He has been teaching at the college since 1979. Prior to coming to CTC, he was a mathematics instructor and department head at Walnut Hills High School.

In recommending Iacobucci for the award, Donna Busse, a former student, said, "I was one of Mr. Frank Iacobucci's students in the spring of 1984. I had been out of school since 1968 and was a bit frightened. His class was the first class that I attended at CTC. I found out that my fear was needless. He made me feel so comfortable and welcome right from the start...the more he taught, the more I wanted to learn...He made each of us in the class feel special and intelligent...Mr Iacobucci doesn't just give out information he teaches."

Thomas Stark, dean of physical sciences,

mathematics, communication skills and social sciences, agreed, "He inspires students to do their best work and challenges them with an extremely effective quiet power. I have never spoken with a student who did not name Mr. Iacobucci as top notch"

In addition to his teaching duties, Iacobucci, a resident of Covedale, is a member of CTC's Marketing Committee, a volunteer member of the Credit Committee of the Cincinnati Public School Employees Credit Union, a member of the Ohio Education Association, and a member of the Ohio Mathematical Association of Two-Year Colleges. He is past secretary for CTC's Faculty Senate, and in his community, Iacobucci volunteered for the 1987 Crusade Against Cancer Campaign.

Iacobucci received the Alice P. Bruckmann Award from CTC's Board of Trustees on June 28th. Of his teaching, Iacobucci said, "I try to offer the whole class a presentation which is both organized and flexible and at the same time extend to each individual the attention and respect to which he or she is entitled by virtue of being a CTC student and a human being."
